

Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act - Youthful Offender Block Grant 2018 Expenditure and Data Report Due Date: October 1, 2018

On or before October 1, 2018, each county is required to submit to the Board of State & Community Corrections (BSCC) a report on its Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act (JJCPA) and Youthful Offender Block Grant (YOBG) programs during the preceding year. For JJCPA this requirement can be found at Government Code (GC) Section 30061(b)(4)(C) and for YOBG it can be found at Welfare & Institutions Code Section (WIC) 1961(c). These code sections both call for a consolidated report format that includes a description of the programs and other activities supported by JJCPA and/or YOBG funds, an accounting of all JJCPA and YOBG expenditures during the prior fiscal year, and countywide juvenile justice trend data.

Prior to submitting this report save the file using the following naming convention: "(County Name) 2018 JJCPA-YOBG Report." For example, Yuba County would name its file "Yuba 2018 JJCPA-YOBG Report".

Once the report is complete, attach the file to an email and send it to: **JJCPA-YOBG@bscc.ca.gov**. All reports will be posted to the BSCC website following a brief technical review. We encourage you to review your report for accuracy before sending it to the BSCC. Please do **NOT** change the report form to a PDF document.

Probation's overarching strategy utilizing JJCPA-YOBG funding is to increase opportunities for treatment, supervision, and service while reducing the risk factors related to recidivism. The first step is the assessment component. Probation utilizes the assessment to inform treatment planning. The youth and family voice and choice are incorporated into the treatment plan. Resources are targeted to meet the specific needs of the youth and family. Cognitive behavioral learning approaches are coupled with interventions with the goal of disrupting delinquency by replacing the negative peer associates and promoting prosocial activities that build positive relationships. Probation utilizes collaborative community based multi-disciplinary teaming along with programs to increase family functioning within the home while also addressing behavioral issues and providing programs with a focus on mental health, trauma, substance abuse, and vocational and educational training.

The Youth Service Center (YSC) is a school-based program that provided integrated support for at-risk students attending school at Elinor Lincoln Hickey Junior/Senior High School and the North Area Community School. The program afforded youth the opportunity to participate in education, counseling and pro-social activities during an extended school day. The YSC was a joint effort of Probation and the Sacramento County Office of Education (SCOE). The program focused on leadership development, positive youth development, job readiness training, after school programming and sports, as well as activities designed to enhance education and student engagement. The Boys and Girls Club (BCG) offered an after-school program at the Elinor Lincoln Hickey campus tailored to the specific needs and interests of the students. In the YSC, an emphasis was placed on academics and career, with a specific focus on helping students develop awareness and exposure to employment opportunities through the trades (e.g. construction, health professions, culinary arts, public services and technology).

Probation used JJCPA funds to support the program including a unit of seven officers, three vehicles, officer equipment, operating expenses, services & supplies and a contract with the BGC. The unit of seven officers was comprised of 4.0 FTE Deputy Probation Officers, 2.0 FTE Senior Probation Officers and 1.0 FTE Supervising Probation Officer.

Through assessments, and with the input of minors and their families, officers in the YOBG Placement Unit developed case plans to identify goals, objectives and specific treatment and/or services needed. Officers then facilitated the appropriate placement of minors into group homes, residential treatment centers, and/or with foster family agencies and programs, both in-state and out-of-state.

Probation used YOBG and JJCPA funds to support the program, including a unit of 7.0 FTE Deputy Probation Officers, one vehicle, officer equipment, operating expenses and services & supplies.

Probation used YOBG funds to support the Education-based Supervision and Age of Majority Juvenile Field units. The officers in these units provided community supervision of moderate to high-risk juvenile offenders and youth in the education-based supervision program. Officers used a validated risk and needs assessment tool to inform case plans and identify appropriate referrals for treatment and services. Additionally, one officer was designated to review Juvenile Field referrals for appropriate assignment to the supervision units, based on each juvenile's identified risk and needs.

#### Education Based Supervision

The Education-based Supervision Model (EBSM) unit placed officers on-site at schools with high concentrations of youth on probation. The EBSM was designed to give officers increased access to youth during the school day which provided a better opportunity supervise and support them in the community. This innovative method of supervision partnered probation officers with school districts in an attempt to positively impact educational outcomes.

This model increased supervision efficiency, involved officers in school activities and promoted healthy relationships with youth and probation officers. As an added benefit, the program improved information-sharing among school resource officers, teachers, and counselors. The EBSM existed in the Sacramento City Unified, Twin Rivers, Elk Grove, Natomas and San Juan Unified School Districts.

#### Age of Majority

The Age of Majority unit provided case management to support young adults under the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Court. Young adults received referrals to transient services, alcohol & drug and behavior intervention services. They also received education and vocational referrals and other supports as needed, such as food and emergency housing. The goal was to provide the support and services necessary for behavior change to occur.

Probation used YOBG funds to support the EBSM and Age of Majority programs, including 30 employees, 16 vehicles, officer equipment, operating expenses and services & supplies. The employees dedicated to these programs included 20.0 FTE Deputy Probation Officers, 6.0 FTE Senior Probation Officers, 3.0 FTE Supervising Probation Officer and 1.0 FTE Administrative Service Officer I.

The Juvenile Sex Offender (JSO) unit supervised youth adjudicated for a violation of Penal Code Section 288 or a reasonably related offense. The JSO program provided non-violent juvenile sex offenders with long-term (17 to 24 months) outpatient treatment designed to reduce the likelihood of re-offense. Following the Juvenile Sex Offender Assessment Protocol-II (J-SOAP-II), the treatment program combined individual and group treatment sessions, relapse prevention strategies, and necessary family counseling to support successful program completion. The counselors and probation officers worked closely to review progress, non-attendance and/or non-participation. Officers took corrective action, when necessary, including initiating warrants and violations of probation.

Probation used JJCPA-YOBG funds to support the program, including a unit of five officers, five vehicles, officer equipment, operating expenses, services & supplies and a contract with Sac Family Solutions for JSO treatment services. The unit of officers included 4.0 FTE Deputy Probation Officers and 1.0 FTE Supervising Probation Officer.

The first step in the juvenile field supervision assignment process is candidacy assessment. Youth subject to a WIC Section 602 petition were provided a risk-and-needs assessment utilizing a validated assessment tool, in collaboration with the youth's family/legal guardian, to determine their risk to recidivate and to identify strengths and areas of need. The assessment results drove the dynamic and individualized case planning process with an emphasis on criminogenic risk and protective factors. The probation officers conducted structured interviews to engage and motivate youth and their families. Through this guided process, evidenced-based programs within the community were discussed and explored with the youth and family. These programs included Functional Family Therapy (FFT), Multi-systemic Therapy (MST), High Fidelity Wraparound services, and other specialized community-based services including cognitive behavioral counseling, treatment, and other best practice interventions. Referrals to community-based providers were made on-site and connection to service was timely. Supervision and support were provided by case managing officers who furthered the collaborative process with service providers, youth, families, and natural supports.

Best practices recognize that reentry begins at the time of admission to detention and continues beyond the youth's release and reintegration into the community. This reentry continuum consists of three overlapping phases: 1) in facility, 2) the transition out of facility and into community, and 3) in community. The JJCPA funds supported the Sacramento Reentry Development for Youth (READY-Go!) program which utilized collaborative teaming to assess strengths and needs, develop transition and case plans, and make connections to services, education, housing and employment prior to release from custody.

Probation used JJCPA funds to support these units including 20 employees, 11 vehicles, officer equipment, operating expenses, services & supplies and community-based contracts. The employees dedicated to this program and funded by JJCPA included 10.0 FTE Deputy Probation Officers, 6.0 FTE Senior Probation Officers, 2.0 FTE Supervising Probation Officers and 2.0 FTE Office Assistants. Probation contracted with River Oak Center for Children to provide MST services and Standford Youth Solutions for FFT services.
