

Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act - Youthful Offender Block Grant 2018 Expenditure and Data Report Due Date: October 1, 2018

On or before October 1, 2018, each county is required to submit to the Board of State & Community Corrections (BSCC) a report on its Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act (JJCPA) and Youthful Offender Block Grant (YOBG) programs during the preceding year. For JJCPA this requirement can be found at Government Code (GC) Section 30061(b)(4)(C) and for YOBG it can be found at Welfare & Institutions Code Section (WIC) 1961(c). These code sections both call for a consolidated report format that includes a description of the programs and other activities supported by JJCPA and/or YOBG funds, an accounting of all JJCPA and YOBG expenditures during the prior fiscal year, and countywide juvenile justice trend data.

Prior to submitting this report save the file using the following naming convention: "(County Name) 2018 JJCPA-YOBG Report." For example, Yuba County would name its file "Yuba 2018 JJCPA-YOBG Report".

Once the report is complete, attach the file to an email and send it to: **JJCPA-YOBG@bscc.ca.gov**. All reports will be posted to the BSCC website following a brief technical review. We encourage you to review your report for accuracy before sending it to the BSCC. Please do **NOT** change the report form to a PDF document.

#### List of Expenditure Categories and Associated Numerical Codes

For each program, placement, service, strategy, or system enhancement, record actual expenditure details for the preceding fiscal year. **Professional Services** includes all services provided by individuals and agencies with whom the County contracts. The county is responsible for reimbursing every contracted individual/agency.

**Community-Based Organizations (CBO)** includes all expenditures for services received from CBO's. **NOTE**: If you use JJCPA and/or YOBG funds to contract with a CBO, report that expenditure on this line item rather than on the Professional Services line item.

**Fixed Assets/Equipment** includes items such as vehicles and equipment needed to implement and/or operate the program, placement, service, etc. (e.g., computer and other office equipment including furniture).

Administrative Overhead includes all costs associated with administration of the program, placement, service, strategy, and/or system enhancement being supported by JJCPA and/or YOBG funds.

At just under 3000 population, few people throughout the state fully appreciate just how small Sierra County is. Further the population has been dropping every year since I became chief in 2009. During those nine years, we have not had a conviction for an offense listed in 707(b) W&I. We have not had to place a juvenile in a group home in something like eight years. We haven't placed a juvenile in a foster home in something like six years. Although wardships are few, over the last several years we have been able to deal with each situation on a local level.

On the other hand, we do have one of the worst truancy rates in the state. Consequently, our one juvenile officer is involved in truancy issues on a regular basis.

Because of our small size, Sierra County does not have the resources to fund any additional positions beyond CPO. If it weren't for state grants, I wouldn't have any deputies. Consequently, I have one deputy funded by SB678 and one funded entirely by YOBG. We have been doing this for several years now. If it weren't for YOBG, the youth of Sierra County would be getting almost zero services from probation.

There is one benefit of being so small: we have plenty of time to handle each case on its individual merits.

#### Re JJCPA

Sierra County does not have a juvenile hall and must contract with Nevada County. Consequently, we use some JJCPA funds to pay for housing costs under "incapacitation". Last summer we started conversations with various stake holders about developing plans for juveniles using JCCPA, but nothing has been finalized yet.
