TRIBAL YOUTH DIVERSION GRANT

Total TYD funding for Cohort 2 is \$10 million including:

- \$9.7 million for new grants
- \$300,000 for BSCC administrative costs

\$9.7 million will support:

- 9 grantees
- Requests of \$600K \$1.4 M



AUTHORIZING LEGISLATION

- Funding: Budget Acts of 2018 & 2019
- Program: AB1812 & AB 1454
- Grantees are federally recognized Indian Tribes in California
- Funding must support:
 - Diversion programs for Indian children
 - Trauma-informed, communitybased, and health-based interventions



LEGISLATION (CONT.)

Target population is Indian children who are:

- Under 18
- Facing entry to the juvenile justice system or further involvement in the system
- Experience:
 - High rates of juvenile arrests
 - High rates of suicide
 - High rates of alcohol & substance abuse
 - Low high school graduation rates
