YOUTH REINVESTMENT GRANT

Total YRG funding for Cohort 2 was \$14.5 million including:

- \$4.6 million from 2019 Budget Act
- \$9.9 million from 2018 Budget Act

\$14.5 million will support:

- 15 grantees
- Requests of \$50K \$2M

BSCC received Administration funding



Eligible Grantees are:

- Nonprofit Organizations
- California Cities & Counties
 - 90% pass through to CBOs

Diversion Services must be:

- Community-based
- Trauma-informed
- Evidence-based
- Culturally relevant
- Developmentally appropriate



Underserved communities High need communities:

- Jurisdictions with high rates of juvenile arrests
- Jurisdictions with disproportionate racial and ethnic disparities within those juvenile arrest rates



Funded services must include:

- Diversion programs
- Alternatives to arrest, incarceration, and formal involvement with the juvenile justice system



Diversion projects must also include one of the following:

- Educational services, including academic and vocational services
- Mentoring services
- Behavioral health services
- Mental health services
