

Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act - Youthful Offender Block Grant 2018 Expenditure and Data Report Due Date: October 1, 2018

On or before October 1, 2018, each county is required to submit to the Board of State & Community Corrections (BSCC) a report on its Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act (JJCPA) and Youthful Offender Block Grant (YOBG) programs during the preceding year. For JJCPA this requirement can be found at Government Code (GC) Section 30061(b)(4)(C) and for YOBG it can be found at Welfare & Institutions Code Section (WIC) 1961(c). These code sections both call for a consolidated report format that includes a description of the programs and other activities supported by JJCPA and/or YOBG funds, an accounting of all JJCPA and YOBG expenditures during the prior fiscal year, and countywide juvenile justice trend data.

Prior to submitting this report save the file using the following naming convention: "(County Name) 2018 JJCPA-YOBG Report." For example, Yuba County would name its file "Yuba 2018 JJCPA-YOBG Report".

Once the report is complete, attach the file to an email and send it to: **JJCPA-YOBG@bscc.ca.gov**. All reports will be posted to the BSCC website following a brief technical review. We encourage you to review your report for accuracy before sending it to the BSCC. Please do **NOT** change the report form to a PDF document.

The focus of the Amador County Probation Department is primarily prevention driven. Identifying juveniles at risk and collaborating with our community based agencies has allowed the juvenile probation officer to access programs which focus acutely on the needs of the minor and their family. Referring minors and their families to programs such as Nexus Aggression Replacement Therapy and 180 Degree U-Turn have proven to help enhance informal interaction with the Probation Department and law enforcement when engaging youth who are at risk within our community. The 2017 year was abnormal in that referrals to the Probation Department were much lower as well as Court intervention. Additionally, more creative dispositions prior to court involvement have been implemented prior to or at intake with the Probation Department. The Probation Department has a strong relationship with the school district as well and is very active with truancy prevention and referring families in need for services.

**Fixed Assets/Equipment** includes items such as vehicles and equipment needed to implement and/or operate the program, placement, service, etc. (e.g., computer and other office equipment including furniture).

Administrative Overhead includes all costs associated with administration of the program, placement, service, strategy, and/or system enhancement being supported by JJCPA and/or YOBG funds.

The mental health clinicians and the juvenile probation officers collaborate to address transportation, access, and financial barriers to ensure the youth receive appropriate mental health treatment.

Amador County Probation contracts and refers youth to Nexus Youth and Family Services for the Aggression Replacement Therapy (ART) groups throughout the school year. The juvenile probation officer collaborates with local schools, Health and Human Services, and parents to assess youth for the ART program. ART groups assist in reducing negative behaviors, disciplinary action in the school setting, time on probation, and recidivism in the Juvenile Justice System. ART is a multi-modal intervention designed to alter the behavior of chronically aggressive youth. It consists of three components: skill streaming which is designed to teach a broad curriculum of pro-social behavior, anger control which is a method for empowering youth to modify their own anger responsiveness, and moral reasoning training which is to help motivate youth to employ the skills learned via the other components. The goals and expected benefits are to promote skill acquisition and performance, improve anger control, decrease the frequency of acting out behaviors, and increase the frequency of prosocial constructive behaviors.

Amador County contracts and refers youth between the ages of 9 through 18 years of age identified as being high risk to Nexus Youth and Family Services for the 180 Degree You-Turn Program. The program offers three different groups throughout the school year. The program encompasses group discussions, conflict resolution, education, leadership, community service, diversity, personal values, integrity and future goals. The Nexus Youth and Family Services' staff organized field trips designed to expose the program participants to a variety of experiences and opportunities which they were actively and cognitively engaged and challenged. During this reporting period, the field trips were to Amador City nature walk, Shenandoah Valley nature walk, Ione Harvest Fair scarecrow contest, Each Mind Matters rock painting activity, Kevin Hines Motivation Presentation, Annual Youth Summit, REACH for the Future leadership conference, and Annual Spotlight Festival showcasing BOOF (Betting On Our Futures).

Assessment Intervention System (JAIS) is embedded in the case management system which is a juvenile assessment tool. The JAIS component classifies the youth as low, medium, or high risks. The assessment also identifies their needs to successfully complete probation and reduce recidivism; such as, mental health or substance abuse referrals, ART or 180 Degree You-Turn Program referral, and family counseling.
