2022 Proposition 47 Grant Project Summaries (in alphabetical order) Grant Cycle September 1, 2022 to June 1, 2026

1. Alameda County Health Care Services Agency

Project Title: ACProp47 Cohort III Grant Funds Awarded: \$6,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: Under this funding opportunity, HCSA proposes to expand on the successful implementation of our ACProp47 Cohort II diversion, substance use disorder, and homeless services for our reentry population as well as implement a Medicated Assistant Treatment program that directly links jail inmates to opioid treatment and recovery supports upon release.

2. Contra Costa County Office of the Public Defender

Project Title: Holistic Intervention Partnership (HIP)

Grant Funds Awarded: \$5,999,999

<u>Summary</u>: Holistic Intervention Partnership (HIP) will improve individual outcomes and reduce criminal legal involvement for 900 indigent Contra Costa residents with mental illness and/or substance dependence who have been arrested (whether cited-released or detained in custody) for misdemeanors or "wobblers." HIP will provide immediate legal representation, civil legal advocacy, and coordinated, community-based, client-specific services, including dedicated funds to preserve or provide housing for the estimated 35% of clients who are homeless or at imminent risk of homelessness at intake.

3. Corona-Norco Unified School District

Project Title: Corona-Norco Unified School District Youth Diversion Program

Grant Funds Awarded: \$1,634,390

<u>Summary</u>: The Corona-Norco Unified School District Youth Diversion Program (YDP) will support youth aged 12 to 21 involved in the criminal justice system by providing mental health services, substance use disorder, diversion programs, treatment, housing-related assistance, job skills and placement services, case management, mentoring, and legal consultations to our target population in the criminal justice system. Our Proposition 47 Grant Program expands and enhances our Cohort II Youth Diversion Program, as well as diversion programs in our community, including the Youth Diversion Team conducted by the Corona Police Department and the Youth Advisory Team conducted by the Riverside County Sheriff's Department. To implement our Cohort III Proposition 47 Grant Program, we will be hiring a Youth Resource Officer, contracting with Community-Based Organizations, and providing evidence-based interventions to our target population. Funding for our Proposition 47 Grant Program will reduce juvenile recidivism rates, divert juvenile offenders from juvenile correctional institutions, and improve performance in school and employment readiness.

4. Kern County Behavioral Health and Recovery Services

Project Title: Kern Transitions Program Grant Funds Awarded: \$6,000,000

Summary: Kern County Behavioral Health & Recovery Services (KernBHRS) recognizes that there are many paths of recovery for individuals with mental health problems and substance use disorders who have been impacted by the criminal justice system. The Kern Transitions Program (KTP) seeks to fills gaps in the local service system to allow these individuals to follow the pathway and receive services tailored to their stages of recovery, criminogenic need and individualized Preferences. Its purpose is to reduce recidivism, enable recovery, and support community reintegration. The project targets individuals who have high criminogenic needs and risk and emphasizes populations and communities that have been historically underserved. The KTP project has two primary service components: an innovative, new Forensic Supportive Services Team that compliments existing mental health and/or substance use teams by offering specialized, integrated, forensic treatment services for clients most at risk; and an Early Intervention and Engagement service to reengage individuals who have not followed through substance use treatment services. It also creates a Peer Mentoring Program employing staff with lived experience to offer guidance and support to individuals currently transiting from jail or prison. The KTP project employs evidence-based treatment approaches, including supported employment, and incorporates trauma-informed care and restorative justice principles and practices. A Local Advisory Committee was consulted in developing the proposal, which entails a collaborative effort between KernBHRS, local government agencies, contract service providers, and key community partners. The project includes a strong data keeping and evaluation component plan to drive decision-making and track progress in meeting its goals and objectives.

5. Los Angeles City Attorney's Office

Project Title: LA Door (Diversion Outreach & Opportunities for Recovery)

Grant Funds Awarded: \$6,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: The Los Angeles City Attorney's Office seeks to expand its transformative LA DOOR (Diversion Outreach and Opportunities for Recovery) model to reach areas in Central and South Los Angeles most in need of robust Proposition 47 services. LA DOOR will provide the following services to a minimum of 850 participants during the grant cycle:

1) reduce recidivism rates through diversion and preventative services, 2) increase participants' use of social services through Mobile Team, Wrap Team, and other linkages, and 3) proactively remove participants' legal barriers through collaborative City Attorney and Public Defender partnership. With LA DOOR, the City Attorney's Office continues to demonstrate commitment to advancing opportunities for treating addiction and mental illness through community health approaches rather than relying solely on traditional prosecution methods.

6. Los Angeles County, Department of Health Services

Project Title: Reentry Intensive Case Management Services (RICMS) and Skills and Experience for the Careers of Tomorrow (SECTOR)

Grant Funds Awarded: \$20,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: The Los Angeles County Department of Health Services Office of Diversion and Reentry – Reentry Division will continue to provide and expand reentry-focused intensive case management, and wrap-around services as well as sector-based employment services to improve behavioral health and employment outcomes and reduce recidivism among justice-involved individuals with mild to moderate substance use and mental health disorders.

7. Los Angeles, City of, Mayor's Office of Economic Opportunity

Project Title: Project imPACT Grant Funds Awarded: \$6,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: Project impact serves justice-impacted adults who have been arrested, charged with, or convicted of a crime, have a history of mental health issues or substance use disorders. The program provides behavioral health and legal services to increase employment placement, retention, and housing stability, thereby reducing recidivism.

8. Marin County, Department of Health and Human Services

Project Title: Housing for Collaborative Court Clients in Behavioral Health Treatment Grant Funds Awarded: \$1,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: We request funding for adults experiencing homelessness in Marin County who are enrolled in court-manded treatment for behavioral health disorders. Stable and supportive housing will increase the number of individuals who maintain and complete behavioral health treatment, resulting in increased self-sufficiency and reduced recidivism.

9. Merced County, Probation Department

Project Title: Merced County Pre-Trial Diversion Program

Grant Funds Awarded: \$6,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: The Merced County Probation Department will expand and enhance existing services to create a more robust pretrial diversion program for individuals who have mental health and/or substance use disorders.

10. Monterey County, Health Department, Behavioral Health Bureau

Project Title: Advancing Transformative Healing and Interpersonal Growth Through

Collaborative Partnerships

Grant Funds Awarded: \$6,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: The aim of our project is to continue to provide prevention programming and a diversion program utilizing an interconnected system of healing. We will provide all services necessary to help individuals struggling with mental illness and/or substance use disorders who are or have been involved in the criminal justice system engage and remain in recovery services and to reduce recidivism rates.

11. Pasadena, City of, Public Health Department

Project Title: Pasadena Outreach Response Team Expansion (PORT-E) Program

Grant Funds Awarded: \$1,143,951

<u>Summary</u>: The City of Pasadena Public Health Department will expand the Pasadena Outreach Response Team (PORT) to provide more individualized case management and wraparound services to the homeless population in Pasadena who are, or have been, criminal justice-system involved and suffer from mental health and/or substance abuse issues. By targeting this population, PORT will assist this subpopulation in breaking the cycle of homelessness and re-arrest.

12. Placer County, Health and Human Services

Project Title: ACTION Team: Promoting Community Health and Safety

Grant Funds Awarded: \$6,000,000

Summary: The intent of the Placer County Proposition 47 Project is to develop community-based solutions for reducing recidivism. The Action Team (AT) is a collaborative multidisciplinary team that develops community-based solutions for reducing recidivism by using principles of restorative justice and offering MH and SUD treatment services combined with diversion activities. AT provides immediate, timely, individualized, and integrated case planning and services to meet the needs of each member and their family. All aspects of the program support positive behavior change to help members address their MH and SUD issues, with an overall goal to prevent recidivism. The Pre-File Program (PFP) is an innovative new component of Cohort 3 where the DA will identify individuals with recent arrests or citations before their charges are filed. Qualified individuals will be provided an opportunity to participate in a several hour educational training at the PREP Center. Following the training, PREP staff will also conduct a brief needs assessment, including identification of MH and SUD treatment needs, and referral to AT. For persons who complete these two requirements, the DA will decline to file charges and the individual will have a clean criminal record. AT and PFP services will help keep individuals out of the judicial system; provide immediate services; improve community safety; and reduce recidivism.

13. San Diego County

Project Title: San Diego County Community Care Coordination

Grant Funds Awarded: \$6,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: The Proposition 47 Grant Program project is designed to improve outcomes and reduce recidivism for persons exiting custody with behavioral health diagnoses who face significant barriers to accessing services and are at high risk of poor outcomes and being homeless or lost to follow-up care upon release. Services will include in-reach and reentry planning, transportation, and immediate connection to housing support upon release from jail, employment connections, and person-centered care coordination and service connections in the community for up to 12 months. The program model includes using peer-led care coordination teams to connect individuals to mental health and substance use disorder treatment and supportive services.

14. San Francisco, Department of Public Health

Project Title: Supporting Treatment & Reducing Recidivism (STARR)

Grant Funds Awarded: \$6,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: The SFDPH STARR program meets one of the most critical community care needs in San Francisco-providing additional residential treatment beds, outpatient case management, and wraparound support services for criminal justice-involved adults with co-occurring substance use disorder and mental health issues. The overall goal is to reduce incarceration and recidivism by bolstering city-wide initiatives focused on jail diversion, recovery, and community re-entry.

15. Santa Barbara County, Department of Behavioral Wellness

Project Title: Crisis, Recovery, Engagement, Diversion & Outreach (CREDO47) Program Grant Funds Awarded: \$6,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: The Crisis, Recovery, Engagement, Diversion & Outreach, Proposition 47 (CRED047) Program is a partnership between Santa Barbara County Department of Behavioral Wellness (co-lead), Public Defender's Office (co-lead), Sheriff's Office, District Attorney's Office, and local community-based organizations, Good Samaritan Shelter, and Family Service Agency. CRED047 diverts individuals with a history of mental illness and/or substance use from the criminal justice system to trauma-informed crisis stabilization and comprehensive mental health and substance use wraparound services, including screening at three points of entry: in the field via Co-Response Team, at the jail during booking, and prior to arraignment. Once diverted, the CRED047 Stabilization Center provides medical monitoring, sobering services, support transitioning from jail and assistance transitioning to substance use treatment. Step-Down Housing provides clients with comprehensive case management services, housing assistance, and social services.

16. Santa Clara County, Behavioral Health Services Department

Project Title: Prop 47 Co-occurring Outpatient and Housing Services

Grant Funds Awarded: \$5,999,289

Summary: The County of Santa Clara - Behavioral Health Services Department (BHSD) Prop 47 Co-occurring Outpatient and Housing Services" will fill gaps in behavioral health treatment for justice-involved client with moderate-severe or persistent mental illness and co-occurring disorders. Specifically, Prop 47 Co-occurring Outpatient and Housing Services will increase slots for co-occurring (mental health and substance use) treatment slots and expand transitional housing units for justice-involved clients. The BHSD will contract with a mental health provider who is well versed in providing specialty co-occurring services, utilizing evidenced based practices and trauma-informed care, to assist justice-involved clients recover from mental illness and substance use disorders. The contracted provider will also provide case management/linkage services to assist justice-involved clients find stable housing and needed community resources that will assist them in meeting basic needs. The BHSD will also contract dedicated transitional housing beds that will guarantee community placement and address housing-shortages

for justice involved clients enrolled in outpatient treatment and who are homeless or at risk of homelessness.

17. Santa Cruz County, Probation Department

Project Title: Coordinated Access for Empowering Success: CAFES – Cohort III

Grant Funds Awarded: \$5,982,074

<u>Summary</u>: The CAFES (Coordinated Access for Empowering Success) Cohort III project, guided by core values of dignity, integrity, and trust, proposes a trauma informed, equity centered, evidenced-based, multi-agency continuum of care model to expand and enhance services for underserved populations. This includes individuals who have committed low level offenses, have been ruled out of county behavioral health services, and do not receive services through other sources of funding such as AB109 or the soon to be implemented CalAIM. The CAFES Cohort III proposal builds on the successes of CAFES Cohort II, fine-tunes the delivery of services, and meets identified needs. Cohort III will place an emphasis on equity, early representation, and expanded diversion opportunities for individuals who have committed low level offenses. CAFES Cohort III will feature partnership with effective community-based organizations and the newly formed Public Defender's Office.

18. Siskiyou County, Health & Human Services; Behavioral Health Division

Project Title: Project Base Camp Grant Funds Awarded: \$2,148,353

<u>Summary</u>: Project Base Camp will provide a 32-bed low-barrier homeless shelter for justice-involved individuals with mental illness and/or substance use disorder (SUD). The objective is to provide safe overnight shelter for individuals in the target population and reduce all barriers to accessing services. Through partnership with County and community-based agencies, Project Base Camp will be the primary access point to community-based services and will reduce the stigma attached to accessing treatment. Project Base Camp will provide or link to crisis support services, case management, homeless outreach, community service opportunities, and linkage to on and offsite peer support services, mental health treatment, substance use treatment, physical healthcare, and education resources (including trade schools). All supportive services for the target population are focused on trauma-informed and strength-based care to meet the guests "where they are" and build motivation for engaging in long-term service involvement.

19. Solano County, Health & Social Services

Project Title: Coordinated Community Re-entry for People in the Justice System with

Behavioral Health Needs

Grant Funds Requested: \$6,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: Create a multi-agency community re-entry (jail discharge) planning coalition, develop a continuum of dedicated housing for people coming out of the jail (with three levels of clinical support), and develop a community-based competency restoration program for people who are incompetent to stand trial on misdemeanor charges.

20. Sonoma County, Health Department, Behavioral Health Division

Project Title: County of Sonoma Proposition 47 Initiative

Grant Funds Awarded: \$1,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: Sonoma County faces a significant need to strengthen engagement with services by individuals returning to the community from the criminal justice system who have mental health and substance use disorders and who have been precariously housed or experienced homelessness. The proposed project will fund a Peer Support Specialist and Mental Health Clinician, both based in CBOs, who will establish relationships with program participants prior to their release from custody and maintain connections upon reentry to the community. These staff will provide assessments of participants, Motivational Interviewing, and support for participant engagement with mental health and substance use disorder treatment, case management and care coordination through the County's Enhanced Care Management program, along with housing supports, workforce training, and enrollment in entitlement programs. The primary goal of the program will be to help these individuals establish and maintain a stable existence in the community and prevent continued cycling through the justice system.

21. Tehama County, Department of Education

Project Title: Project Restore Grant Funds Awarded: \$6,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: PROJECT RESTORE was designed to provide mental health treatment and substance abuse treatment using evidenced-based strategies and coordinated case management to Proposition 47 clients and their families. Under the coordination of the Tehama County Department of Education, PROJECT RESTORE is an adolescent and young adult diversion program. PROJECT RESTORE intent aligns with the spirit of Proposition 47: to engage strong community partnerships, focus on our target population, reduce recidivism, provide client- centered treatment and support clients dealing with mental health and substance abuse, provide supportive services such as housing, education, and job training, and collect and share our data outcomes. All partners will have a common shared goal of responsibility, allowing a multi-disciplinary agency involvement ensuring that our clients can become healthy and productive members of society.

22. Vallejo, City of, Police Department

Project Title: Project HOME (Homeless Outreach, Mentorship, and Empowerment)

Grant Funds Awarded: \$999,611

<u>Summary</u>: Address systems gaps identified for ages 16-24 through establishing and sustaining a Diversion Program combined with mental health, substance use disorder treatment, housing and community-based supportive services including life and job skills training and intensive case management.

23. Yolo County, District Attorney

Project Title: Pathway to Home Grant Funds Awarded: \$1,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: Yolo County proposes to use Proposition 47 grant funds to reduce recidivism by expanding access to mental health treatment, wrap-around supportive services, and housing for adults charged with misdemeanors that they are incompetent to stand trial due to a mental illness.

24. Yolo County, Health & Human Services Agency

Project Title: Connections to CARE (Community, Assistance, Recovery, and

Engagement)

Grant Funds Awarded: \$6,000,000

<u>Summary</u>: Yolo County's Connections to CARE (Community, Assistance, Recovery, and Engagement) proposes to use Proposition 47 Grant funds to reduce recidivism by expanding access to substance use disorder (SUD) treatment and trauma-informed intensive case management, peer support, housing, and other wrap-around supportive services for adults with a history of SUD and current or recent justice system involvement, with an emphasis on individuals experiencing homelessness. The project aims to improve the behavioral health of participants with identified behavioral health needs through engagement in appropriate services and reduced risk/harm related to ongoing substance use; increase the self-sufficiency of participants through secured stable housing, improved income, and enrollment in health insurance; and reduce the justice system involvement for participants through prevention of further justice system involvement and diversion in which participants may have their SUD-related charge dismissed.
